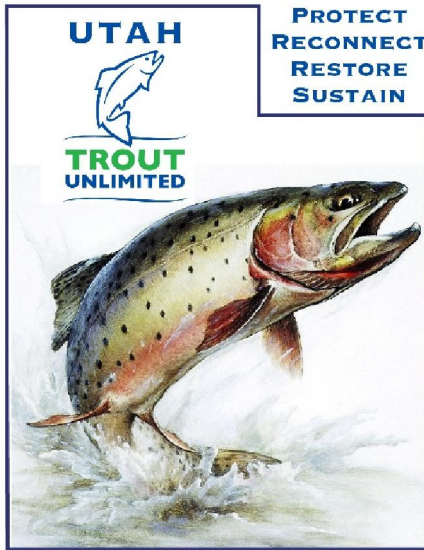


TROUT UNLIMITED



Trout Unlimited (TU) is a national conservation group founded in 1959 dedicated to Protecting, Reconnecting, Restoring, and Sustaining our coldwater fisheries. TU is supported by member donations and 90% of the funds raised by TU go directly into conservation programs.

Trout Unlimited and all of our chapters are 501(c)(3) tax-exempt entities, and your donation is tax-deductible to the extent allowed by law.

Utah Trout Unlimited has eight chapters located in northern and southern Utah. In addition to the chapters, there is a State Council comprised of members from each chapter. UTAH COUNCIL OF TROUT UNLIMITED

The Council consists of men and women from the chapters that coordinate activities between chapters. Over the years, the Utah Council has addressed many issues facing our coldwater fisheries. These include: Whirling Disease, Aquaculture, establishing a balanced Fish Health Policy Board, In-Stream Flows, Protecting Access to Public Lands, Stream Restoration, FERC Relicensing, Responsible Oil and Gas Exploration, Roadless Areas, Responsible Grazing Practices, Native Fish Recovery. This year we were successful in supporting DWR in their effort to obtain funding to rebuild the Loa Fish Hatchery. We routinely follow state efforts to limit or enhance fishing opportunities and take action as needed to obtain a favorable outcome.

Non-members are always welcome, so drop by for good conversation, interesting programs, and fish tales. Currently, we have over 200 members. In addition to lots of chapter fishing outings in Utah and surrounding states, some of our conservation activities are:

Boot Washing Stations on the Middle Provo – to reduce the transport of aquatic invasive species

Strawberry River Willow Planting – Replanting of 1100 willows along the East Fork of the Strawberry River

Temperature Monitoring in the Middle Provo River – Establish a data baseline and understand the effects of low flows in the Middle Provo River during periods of drought.

Catch and Release Tool – a simple tool to release fish without netting or touching them

Garbage Clean-Ups – Working with Fish for Garbage, collected over 12,000 pounds of garbage removed from the Lower Provo River, Mill Hollow Reservoir, Strawberry Reservoir, and Current Creek.

Electro-Shocking on the Lower Provo – worked with DWR to conduct fish population studies along the Lower Provo River.

WEBER BASIN ANGLERS

TU CHAPTER 681



Weber Basin Anglers covers Davis, Weber, and Morgan counties. The chapter works to protect the Weber and Ogden Rivers, their tributaries, lakes, and other local waters.

Strawberry Creek – built over 375 feet of fish passage structures under I-84 near Mountain Green

Bonneville Cutthroat Trout – worked with DWR to capture and tag Bonneville cutthroat trout in the Weber River for population studies.

Wildfire Restoration – rebuilt the Fisherman's Point Angler Access parking lot following the 2017 wildfire and participated in revegetation along the river. **Trout in the Classroom** – eight aquariums in schools

High Desert Anglers is the TU chapter representing the Uinta Basin. High Desert Anglers usually meets at the Sportsman's Warehouse in Vernal on the 2nd Thursday of each month. More information can be found on Facebook. With over 50 members, we have accomplished many projects, including:

Single Fly Fundraiser – A fly fishing competition on the famous Green River that generates funds for projects.

Big Brush Creek – Stream restoration and angler access in coordination with Uinta County, DWR, and BLM.

Calder Reservoir – Raised funds to refit oxygenators on Calder Reservoir to increase the winter survival of trout.

Annual Green River Clean-Up – Every August, working with the Green River Outfitters and Guides to remove trash and debris from the Green River.

Las Vegas Pipeline – Scientifically demonstrated the damage a 300-mile pipeline would do to local streams

UTAH CUTTHROAT SLAM



The Cutthroat Slam was established as a joint effort of TU staff, the Utah TU State Council, and the Division of Wildlife Resources to raise awareness about the native cutthroat species found in Utah. The money raised from the \$20 registration goes directly to cutthroat trout restoration and education. Over 1,000 anglers have completed their quest to catch all four species of native Utah trout and received their medallion. As of April 2023, the program has raised over \$80,000. Over 4,000 fishers have signed up for the Cutthroat Slam.
